

#### Food security and Urbanization

 Urbanization has been growing constantly worldwide since the 1950s



#### The impact of urbanization

- Urbanization, poverty and socio-political unrest
- Different structure of households
- Higher vulnerability to food prices volatility
- Higher reliance on infrastructures/services
- Need to access official safety-net programs
- Expanding cities 

  crowding out of peri-urban agriculture
- Food security and waste management




### Urbanization and Food security in the SMCs (II)

The Cereal Import Dependency Ratio as a proxy measure of macro food security




# Urbanization and Food security in the SMCs (III)

The Food imports over total merchandise as a proxy measure of macro food security




# **Urbanization in the Euro-Mediterranean Region (I)**

#### Some preliminary conclusions

- Food Vulnerability + fast paced urbanization as key features of SMCs
- Overall converging pattern of urbanization in the Euro-Mediterranean area
- Similar local governance issues surfacing in the policy agendas of both European and South Mediterranean countries.
- Yet, so far → no attempts at building a solid network of Euro-Mediterranean cities for food security

### The City of Milan: from Expo 2015 to the UFPP

- The "Urban Food Policy Pact" (UFPP): a participative global effort to define and adopt a common standard regarding food security and nutrition at the urban level
- Developing solutions for the new patterns of hunger
- Defining the best way through towards a more equitable and sustainable way of urban living.

#### The UFPP: main steps

- Creation of 3 international working groups (Nutrition, Access to food and Environment)
- Definition of issues to be addressed;
- First drafting of the Pact expected to take place in February 2015 in London;
- Adoption of the final version to be presented to other cities in October 2015 in Milan

# Local food policies in the Mediterranean Region: opportunities...

- De facto empowerment of local governments in SMCs deriving from involvement in food policy elaboration
- Increased accountability, closer connection between the citizens and the administration, higher responsiveness by the government
- Stronger Euro-Mediterranean ties

#### ...And challenges

- Long tradition of administrative and political centralization
- Extremely low local government expenditure in SMCs
- Need to adapt the EU's CAP to the specific challenges characterizing the Euro-Mediterranean region
- Political will, especially at the local level, from both the shores of the Mediterranean
